Edmund Bull is renowned for his talent as both a musician in both traditional and contemporary music. He and the Red Bull Singers are renowned world champion singers respected across Indian country. They have sung together now for over 30 years, hailing from the Little Pine Cree Nation near North Battleford, Saskatchewan. Red Bull first gained national attention for Edmund's co-creation of the Juno award winning round dance song Darling Don't Cry, that featured Buffy Sainte-Marie, which led to a 1995 performance on CBC's Rita MacNeil Show.

With Edmund's leadership, Red Bull has been honoured and requested to attend celebrations across Canada, the United States and even Europe. A few highlights overseas include the 1994 Goodwill Games in Russia, Poland, Finland, and Sweden. As a country roots artist, Edmund reflects his Cree culture and language within his songs. His album, *Indian Boy*, was nominated as Best Male Artist at the 2000 Canadian Aboriginal Music Awards in Toronto.

He was also nominated as Best Male Artist at the 2001 Native American Music Awards. Edmund has also been nominated as Best Male Artist at the 2002 Native American Music Awards for his album *End of the Trail*. And in 2007, he won Best Male Artist at the Native American Music Awards for his release Follow Your Dreams. Edmund Bull, a voice to be recognized in the Speak Up Exhibition.
